"Practice Resurrection"

I've been musing on the meaning of Easter and its relevance in this day and age. As a child, Easter meant egg hunts, Easter baskets, and sometimes a new dress or shoes. It was a time when the forsythia, tulips, and daffodils burst into life symbolizing spring had truly arrived. Today, Easter resonates on a different level for me.

A favorite poet of mine, Wendell Berry, wrote a collection of poems entitled Sabbaths, which he composed on Sundays over a period of years. At the end of an Easter Sunday poem, he challenged his readers to "practice resurrection!" What could he mean? What could it mean for us? At the very least, it is a challenge to understand Easter in a different way—that it is not just a day "to remember" that Christ rose from the dead, but something more, something that includes us, that puts "resurrection" in our lap, our lives, and our world.

I was thinking about this and about how dark and death-dealing the world can seem these days. To be sure, there is so much pain, poverty, and anger that is a part of our world. More insidious, perhaps, is the moral and spiritual decay that seems pervasive. Each and every day, the media surrounds us with all that is seemingly wrong with the world. Much as we might dream of a return to a simpler, less complicated world, the Andy Griffith "Mayberry" days are long gone.

It is good to remember that Christ, too, in his day was surrounded by the evils of his time—the power hungry, the oppression of the poor, intolerance, sexism, racism—all of this was a part of his world. Yet in the midst of it all, he stood for love, tolerance, acceptance, forgiveness, and peace among all people. This was the "light" that Christ embodied, and he bore it in the face of all the death-dealing of his time when many succumbed to fear and depression. In the midst of it, he rose above and was a living testament to the power of good over evil, life over death.

This Easter season, consider how you might strive each day to be a living light of hope and love in the darkness of our time. In the midst of social, moral, emotional, and spiritual death, where can we be a life-giving sign of resurrection for the world?

Practice resurrection! Each day, every day!
