CATHOLIC SOCIAL TEACHING

Today's Gospel tells the story of the landowner and the day laborers. Day laborers are those who wait in the public square hoping to be hired. If they are hired, it is for one day, with no guarantee that they will have work tomorrow. When the landowner returned to the public square late in the day, he was surprised to find men there. It did not occur to him that these were desperate men who had no land of their own (only the first son inherited the father's land) and had to depend on others like the landowner to hire them for planting and harvesting. The rest of the year they had to try to find odd jobs or beg.

What does this story say about the injustices of society in that time? Does it relate to our own society?

Scripture Readings for September 30/October 1 26th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Ezekiel 18:25-28 | Psalm 25 | Philippians 2:1-11 | Matthew 21:28-32

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The St. Vincent de Paul Society visits people in all kinds of distress to offer a helping hand and a listening ear. Volunteers go to the homes of anyone who requests help. The home visit is the basic, most fundamental activity of a Vincentian ministry. Rather than have people come to us, we go to the homes of those in need. During this visit we learn the nature of the problem as well as more about their other needs. Whatever the



person shares with us remains *confidential* between the Vincentian conference and the person. A home visit is always done by a minimum of two Vincentians, never alone. We listen to the person or family, getting their perspective on the problem and its resolution. The information gathered at the initial visit is brought back to the SVDP meeting and discussed. It is a joint decision within our conference as to what assistance we are able to provide. One of our most important gifts to leave behind is a feeling that someone cares and that there is hope. We celebrate the works of our parish SVDP conference and encourage everyone to consider becoming part of this arm of the Church's ministry.

DID YOU KNOW...

Along with home visits we

- Provide rent and energy assistance,
- Provide vouchers for furniture and household items available at our SVDP stores,
- Coordinate the food pantry, open every other Tuesday,
- Sponsor the blood drive twice a year,
- Serve at the south side meal site.
- Sponsor twinning efforts with the Philippines,
- We served at Mt. Carmel/Kindred over 40 years until closing.

These outreach services are only possible through your monetary support. Please consider SVDP when making your donations.

Refugees around the World*

20.7 million refugees under United Nations High Commissioner for Refugees 5.7 million Palestine refugees under UN Relief and Works Agency mandate 48.0 million internally displaced people

- 4.1 million asylum seekers
- 3.9 million Venezuelans displaced abroad

When an alien resides with you in your land, do not mistreat such a one. You shall treat the alien who resides with you no differently than the natives born among you; you shall love the alien as yourself. I, the LORD, am your God. Leviticua 19: 33-34

Just five countries produce 68% of all refugees displaced abroad: the Syrian Arab Republic, Venezuela, Afghanistan, South Sudan, and Myanmar.

The top five host countries where these displaced people are currently located are: Turkey, Colombia, Germany, Pakistan, and Uganda.

8.2 million Afghans are being hosted by neighboring countries; over 1.6 million have arrived since 2021. After more than 40 years, Afghan refugees continue to make up one of the largest and most protracted displacement situations under UNHCR's mandate.

After ten years, Syria remains the world's largest refugee crisis. More than 6.8 million Syrians have been forced to flee their country since 2011. The vast majority – approximately 5.2 million refugees – have found refuge in neighboring countries, primarily in Türkey, Lebanon and Jordan. Germany is the largest non-neighboring host country, with more than 620,000 Syrian refugees.

6 million Venezuelans have left the country since 2014. This is the largest exodus in Latin America's recent history and one of the largest displacement crises in the world. Twenty percent of the population has fled the country and people continue to leave at an average of 5,000 per day. Venezuela, a country that has traditionally been a generous host to refugees, is now facing its own displacement crisis. The humanitarian crisis in Venezuela has become the second largest international displacement crisis in the world with 6 million Venezuelans. A majority of displaced Venezuelans live in Colombia, Peru, Ecuador, Chile, and the United States.

Why people are fleeing:

Climate Change

Climate-related displacement and migration is set to be the greatest challenge of our era. While there is a general consensus that global warming impacts us all, the role it will play in future human migration is often underestimated. Climate change disproportionately impacts developing countries, and more specifically fragile states.

Violence and Political Turmoil

Conflicts are not unique to recent or contemporary history. But these movements have intensified and become more concentrated for reasons including prolonged civil war and violence between various populations along ethnic and political lines,

Shortage of food and medicine

Millions were pushed into poverty in the immediate aftermath of the pandemic. Many have lost their livelihoods and are increasingly unable to meet their basic needs.

Human Rights Violations

The economic downturn has exposed people to multiple protection risks such as child labor, gender-based violence, and other forms of exploitation.

How you Can Help

A refugee's story doesn't just end once they've been resettled in a new country. After their long journey to safety, they still need your support. You can welcome new refugees who are arriving in your community by offering shelter, support, or even a job.

UNHCR released data showing that the number of people displaced by climate-change-related disasters since 2010 has risen to 21.5 million.

Overall, there are a variety of solutions available for stopping climate change by reducing carbon emissions. Planting trees is an effective way to reduce carbon dioxide because trees absorb carbon dioxide from the atmosphere and store it in their trunks, leaves, and roots. Promoting sustainable practices in your community is an important part of reducing emissions. This includes encouraging individuals and businesses to use fewer resources such as water or electricity, buying locally produced goods, reducing food waste, and investing in renewable energy sources such as solar or wind power.

The meat industry has far-reaching effects on our climate. Cows emit tons of methane simply through digestion, particularly when they eat processed grain. Furthermore, deforestation for cattle ranching in places like Brazil destroys local habitat and the carbon reduction potential of forests. Eating less meat by eliminating one meat meal per week can be a great way to limit carbon emissions. Of course, just one person altering their habits might not make much of a difference, but as a society we dictate the supply and demand of our food systems depending on what we buy and consume.
