

VIRTUE OF THE WEEK

Some Thoughts on our Old Testament Advent Scriptures

In this sacred season, the Sunday readings from the Old Testament tell a story in and of themselves. If we look at these readings from each of the four Sundays of Advent together, they comprise sort of a conversation between the people and God. We would see that Advent is a season of hope, of expectation, and of complaint!

Our reading from the prophet Isaiah today begins with a lament—a complaint about the sinfulness of the people. The reading for next week gives us God's response to the people—words of comfort and encouragement. In the Third Sunday of Advent, the voice of the prophet responds to God's comforting word. The complaints and lamentations are over as this reading is filled with hope. On the Fourth Sunday of Advent, we hear again from God with words of reassurance and hope for the people.

As we journey through Advent this year, may we each share all that is within our hearts with God (even our complaints) and may we take the time to listen for God's words of comfort to each of us.



Everyday Stewardship: In the Unexpected

"What could happen next?" How many times have you asked yourself that question in the past year? Though we most often use that expression when things don't seem to be going our way, this year it has been an expression of the constant changes to our world which the COVID-19 pandemic has wrought. But we might use the same expression to explain our feelings of being overwhelmed by blessings and good things, when the stars seem to align just right.

No matter what, we can say with certainty that tomorrow will not go exactly as we envisioned. Our lives are influenced by so many factors and the world around us is increasingly complex. Rather than be surprised by the unexpected, maybe we should expect the unexpected.

Living in this manner causes us to cherish more deeply the gifts we have been given. It helps us to live in the present and become mindful of those around us. Our relationships deepen. Our sense of responsibility builds. Our stewardship way of life finds new meaning and purpose.

This Advent will not be the same experience as last Advent. It remains to be seen what the coming days and weeks have in store for each of us. However, no matter what happens, Jesus Christ is there to welcome us to the unexpected. He will celebrate with us in joy and he will even feel our pain. You can count on the unexpected, but you can also count on Him to be there with you. He is now and forever, Emmanuel, "God with us." He is the expected in all things unexpected.

Week 1: Hope

(Excerpted from a reflection on "Maya Angelou and the Freedom Poetry of Advent")

Reflect. Particularly during Advent, Christians are called to dwell in the shadows. After all, it's in the dark that we light candles, since that's where they'll do the most good. With this in mind, instead of simply "lighting a candle of hope," first turn toward specific shadows of hopelessness in our lives, in our neighbors' lives, and around the world. With Angelou, remember that hope and despair often ebb and flow with our days, and that many people struggle with sorrow and depression. Then keep watch, strike a match, pray, and sing.

Pray. God of light and hope, of darkness and dawn, be with us in the shadows, even and especially in the valley of the shadow of death. Show us the way, and let us be lanterns of hope for others. Keep us awake and alert to your coming. Tear open the heavens; let the mountains of despair quake at your presence. Come, Jesus, come. Amen.

The Archdiocesan Prison and Jail Ministry will be holding an event to address how the Church can enhance its support for individuals involved in the criminal-justice system.


